

- Develop our employees at all levels of the agency.




DHS-Re-entry Goals

- Help prisoners reconnect with their children & their financial responsibilities.
- Help prisoners successfully transition back into society & reduce recidivism.
- Help promote self sufficiency, independence and work/job.



Transitional Centers Map







- Since 2010 DHS and DOC have collaborated to offer a Re-entry Program at 13 Transitional Centers in Georgia.
- DHS contracted with DOC to oversee the Re-Entry Program and the PAVE (Parent Access Visitation Education) curriculum taught to Transition Center residents.



Continued-Background

- Highlights includes:
 - 1,022 Graduates
 - 614 Graduates with Child Support Cases
 - 549 Graduates left Transitional Centers and entered the DHS Fatherhood Program for Non-Custodial Parents
- Recidivism rate for DHS program participates versus the national/state average is excellent.
 - National 25.8%,
 - Statewide 15.3%,
 - DHS Re-Entry Program 3.8%
