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## How the Big Bills Fared: DHS-Related Legislation

#### Aging-Related Legislation

- SB 14 (Georgia Alzheimer's and Related Dementias State Plan Task Force; create): Passed both chambers as amended; signed by Governor Deal.
- HB 78 (Crimes and offenses; protection of disabled adults and elder persons; change provisions): Passed both Chambers as amended; signed by Governor Deal.

#### Child Support-Related Legislation

- SB 193 (Uniform Interstate Family Support Act; update): Passed both Chambers as amended; signed by Governor Deal.
- HB 236 (Uniform Interstate Family Support Act; update): Bill remains in House Rules.



## How the Big Bills Fared: DHS-Related Legislation

- Division of Family & Children Services-Related Legislation
  - Juvenile Code Re-Write
    - HB 242 (Courts; juvenile proceedings, substantially revise provisions): Passed both Chambers as amended. Signed by Governor Deal.
  - Public Assistance
    - HB 138 (Temporary Assistance; use of electronic benefit transfer cards in certain retail establishments): Bill remains in House Governmental Affairs Committee.
    - HB 181 (Financial Institutions; use of EBT cards in automated teller machines to obtain cash; prohibit): Bill remains in House Banks & Banking.
    - SB 163 (Community Health Dept; required to study and identify options for Medicaid reform): Passed House Health & Human Services. Remains in House Rules.



### DHS-Related Legislation – Passed By Day 40

- HB 21 (Adoption; postadoption contact agreements; provide): Passed both chambers as amended; signed by Governor Deal.
- HB 354 (Early Care and Learning, Department of; provide certain information to owners of early care and education programs; require): Passed by both chambers as amended; signed by Governor Deal.
- HB 446 (Guardian and ward; proposed ward who resided in another state prior to submission of guardianship or conservatorship petition for such proposed ward; provide certain additional notice requirements): Passed both chambers; signed by Governor Deal.



#### DHS-Related Legislation – Did *Not* Pass By Day 40

- HB 428 (Foster Children's Psychotropic Medication Monitoring)
  - Bill Summary: Legislation would have required DHS/DFCS to establish reporting and tracking requirements related to the provision of mental health services and the administration of psychotropic medication. Remains in House Health & Human Services.
- HB 46 (Day-care centers; satisfactory child protective services reports for employees and directors; require)
  - Bill Summary: This legislation would require DFCS to report to DECAL information from the Child Abuse Registry. Remains in House Judiciary Non-Civil.
