### 2016 - 2019 DAS Strategic Plan *Goals*

#### Goal 1: Food Security

**Description:** Empower older adults to stay active and healthy by increasing food security and access to healthy food options

#### **Strategies:**

- 1. Increase access to healthy food options for older adults by connecting them to local food systems
- 2. Implement a person-centered approach to dining options
- 3. Quarterly SNAP sign up days at senior centers
- 4. Develop a partner group to support and implement a State Senior Hunger Summit
- 5. Evaluate the extent of choice of dining options
- 6. Expand the role of site councils to improve dining choices

### 2016 - 2019 DAS Strategic Plan Goals

#### Goal 3: Self-Sufficiency

**Description:** Older adults and adults with disabilities will remain independent and in their desired residence as long as possible

#### **Strategies:**

- 1. Identify and prioritize potential underserved populations to reach and offer services
- 2. Options Counselors and LTCO collaborate to assist nursing facility residents who have expressed interest in learning more about less restrictive housing options
- 3. Expand service types and options available to consumers
- 4. Implement a Kinship Care Continuum including Voluntary Kinship Care
- 5. Expand partnership with Centers for Independent Living for cross support in transition activities
- 6. Enhance PGO staff's practice of determining the preference or wishes of a person under guardianship and incorporating that input into surrogate decision-making
- 7. Refer cases that are more appropriate for less restrictive alternatives back to court
- 8. Increase the number of multi-disciplinary/multi-agency groups in which PGO staff participates



### **State Independent Living Council of Georgia (SILC)**

- The Statewide Independent Living Council is a systems advocacy and planning organization.
- Members include all nine Centers for Independent Living.
- Work for systemic change in the areas that are the biggest barriers to people with disabilities participating fully in their communities.
- Current 3-year plan focuses on:
  - Accessible Housing
  - Assistive Technology
  - Transportation




# **Centers for Independent Living (CILs)**

- Centers for Independent Living (CILs) are non-residential, community-based organizations, governed and staffed by people with disabilities, that offer a wide variety of services to consumers with disabilities and their families.
- Includes peer-to-peer relationship, where people with disabilities act as mentors for other people with disabilities, showing them by example how to help themselves and to live independently.
- The core services that CILs provide are:

Individual Advocacy and Systems Advocacy Peer Counseling Information and Referral Independent Living Skills Training




# Locations of 9 Centers for Independent Living

# Division of Aging Services & Centers for Independent Living (CILs): History

- Grew partnership through Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC) collaboration
- Contracted with CILs through small grants
- Policy requires that ADRC Advisory Council include a CIL Board member in areas where CILs are located
- Panelists in regional meetings held to organize ADRC movement
- Cross training and referrals



### Division of Aging Services & Centers for Independent Living (CILs): Current Collaboration

- Contracting with all 9 CILs to serve as Community Access Points
- Deliverables include:
  - Transitioning a minimum of 6 individuals from nursing homes using Money Follows the Person (MFP) or Nursing Home Transitions (NHT)
  - Assisting callers with benefits application assistance (Food stamps, Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income)
  - Completing an initial screening for Medicaid waivers
  - Data entry
- Strengthening partnerships between Area Agencies on Aging & CILs



### Division of Aging Services & Centers for Independent Living (CILs): Future Collaboration

- Recognizing CILs as equal partners and Community Access Points through Georgia's No Wrong Door
- Continued Work to Strengthen:
  - Cross Training and Cross Referrals
  - Nursing Home Transitions (regardless of fund source)
  - Assisting callers with benefits application assistance (Food stamps, Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income)
  - Completing an initial screening for Medicaid waivers
  - Data entry
